Google Chrome

1. Open the browser and the **Settings** menu (or the **three vertical dots** to the right of the menu bar).
2. Scroll down and click on **Advanced Settings**.
3. Select **Open a specific page or set of pages** under **On Startup**.
4. Select **Set pages** and enter or add <http://rccgbethel.church/>.

Mozilla Firefox

1. Open Firefox. Press **Alt-T** on the keyboard and select **Options** from the drop-down menu or go to **Tools >> Options** from the main menu.
2. In the **Home** section, select **Homepage and new windows** and **Custom URLs...** from the field's drop down.

Microsoft Edge

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Will Versus Grace (Part II)

Text: Matthew 19:16-22

Last week, we compared grace to will-power and considered how limited will-power could be while grace has no limits because it is the gift of God. We also talked about Saul who had strong will-power but needed grace to become Paul and Simon who was like a reed, but also needed grace to become Peter, the rock on which God built his church. Moses also failed to enter the promise land because he disobeyed God's instruction.

Jesus told Peter he would no longer be Simon, but if we examine Peter's life, we can see he was never just Peter (1 Pet 1:1; 2 Peter 1:1). In contrast, Paul left the "Saul" personality behind after his conversion and began to see himself as Paul (Acts 13:9). This is probably where the habit of assigning "new" baptismal names come from. When the old nature is dead and buried, the new life should have a new name to reflect the newness.

How we see ourselves matter (Prov 23:7). Peter always saw himself as Simon Peter. For example, instead of extending grace to his fellow believers, he judges and condemns them (Gal 2:11-14). Likewise, many of us start under grace, but always revert to living under the law. The conflict and confusion makes us unhealthy and unable to grow. We try to live as "Peter", but we still see ourselves as "Simon".

How do you see yourself as a Christian? Are you a product of grace or are you still trying to obey God by will-power? The word translated grace in the Old Testament is the Hebrew word "*chen*" (e.g. Gen 6:8). It means mercy, kindness or graciousness. God showed mercy and favour to Noah although he did nothing to deserve it.

In the New Testament, grace is "*charis*", coined from "*charisma*" and that goes beyond favour. It means "gratifying in manner" or "that which causes delight". Charis has some mystical connotations. For example, we talk of someone having charis or charisma (charm), with persuasive abilities that are often lauded or revered.

Apostle Paul used the word "grace" to indicate unearned or unmerited favour i.e. something completely undeserved that could never have been achieved by ourselves. It's the ability that transforms us from a "Simon" to a 'Peter' and from a 'Saul' to 'Paul'. It comes from faith (Eph 2:8) and the transformation is both instant and continuous (2 Cor 3:18; Phil 3:12-19).

As we've established before, Christianity is meant to be enjoyed not endured. It's not about the things around us, but the grace of God. It is what sets us apart, breaking us from the legacy of living under the law. We need to unlearn the lessons of living by will-power and begin to live by grace. It could make the difference between success and failure.

Bottom line:

God takes us on a journey, but he gives us grace to endure that journey and excel. We must not take that grace for granted (Heb 10:29).
