Google Chrome

1. Open the browser and the **Settings** menu (or the **three vertical dots** to the right of the menu bar).
2. Scroll down and click on **Advanced Settings**.
3. Select **Open a specific page or set of pages** under **On Startup**.
4. Select **Set pages** and enter or add <http://rccgbethel.church/>.

Mozilla Firefox

1. Open Firefox. Press **Alt-T** on the keyboard and select **Options** from the drop-down menu or go to **Tools >> Options** from the main menu.
2. In the **Home** section, select **Homepage and new windows** and **Custom URLs...** from the field's drop down.
3. Enter or paste the URL: <http://rccgbethel.church/> or click **Use Current Page** if you are already on our website.

Microsoft Edge

1. Click the **three horizontal dots** to the right of the top menu bar.
2. Select **Settings** and select **A Specific Page or Pages** from the **Open Microsoft Edge With** section drop down options.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Our help comes from God

Text: Psalm 121:1-8

Crisis is part of life. But how we respond or handle them could make a big difference to their impact on our lives. A Psalmist said "**My times are in your hands...**" (Psa 31:15). It is important that we let God handle our crises. Our text today tells us our help comes from the Lord and nowhere else. Not even the hills – no matter how vast or strong. God makes heaven and earth.

In other words, putting our trust in government, structures or other things will not help us. At one time or the other, those things will fail. The Psalmist has obviously experienced a time of hardship and learnt that help can only come from God and God alone.

We need God's help, love, guidance to endure our journey on earth, and through the highs and lows. Psalm 23:4 says: "**Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.**" Jesus promised never to leave or forsake us (Heb 13:5). He's always with us and we need to remember that. The presence of trials or trouble does not imply the absence of God.

God is the creator of heaven and earth (Psa 121:2). That means he's always in control. Therefore, when we feel helpless, we can be strong because it is in our weakness that he's made strong (2 Cor 12:9). He also never slumber nor sleep (Psa 121:4). In other words, he's always at alert and ready to help.

The Lord is working in us to do and to will, and he's doing that even right now (Phil 2:13). He's our help and he gave us the Holy Spirit who is our **Parakletos** (Greek) i.e. the one who walks alongside us and pleads our cause before God. He will teach us all things (John 14:26).

God allows trials so we can discover where our strength and source of support can be found. Then we become a testimony of his goodness for others. God has a greater purpose for all of us and will always be there to answer us when we call upon him. So, let our character be free from anything that turns our eyes away from God. In turn, he will never forsake us (Heb 13:5-6).

Bottom line:

We either let crisis handle us or we learn to hand it over to God. Know that it is in time of crisis that we need God most. The good news is he's always ready to receive and help us.
