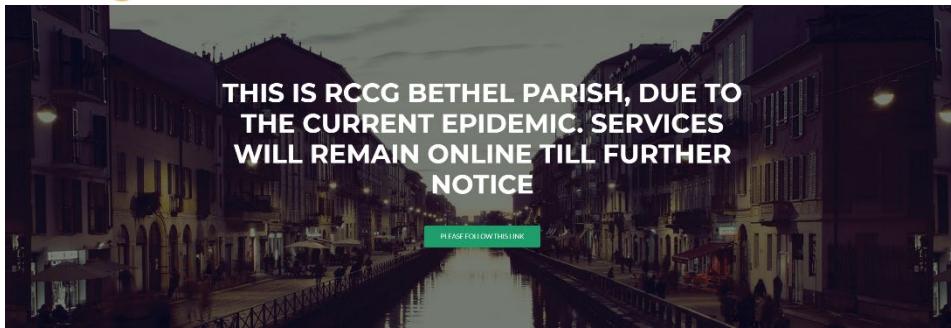

So, why don't you set our homepage as one of your **startup page(s)** in your browser now? The following instructions for most of the common browsers may help.

## Google Chrome

1. Open the browser and the **Settings** menu (or the **three vertical dots** to the right of the menu bar).
2. Scroll down and click on **Advanced Settings**.
3. Select **Open a specific page or set of pages** under **On Startup**.
4. Select **Set pages** and enter or add <http://rccgbethel.church/>.

## Mozilla Firefox

1. Open Firefox. Press **Alt-T** on the keyboard and select **Options** from the drop-down menu or go to **Tools >> Options** from the main menu.
2. In the **Home** section, select **Homepage and new windows** and **Custom URLs...** from the field's drop down.
3. Enter or paste the URL: <http://rccgbethel.church/> or click **Use Current Page** if you are already on our website.

## Microsoft Edge

1. Click the **three horizontal dots** to the right of the top menu bar.
2. Select **Settings** and select **A Specific Page or Pages** from the **Open Microsoft Edge With** section drop down options.

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

### ***Our response to modern warfare: Afghanistan***

#### **Text: Romans 12:18-19**

#### **Should Christians be pacifists?**

The bible teaches us not to kill each other indiscriminately, and about justice and peace from the Ten Commandments in the Old Testament to the New Testament. We're told not to murder (Ex 20:13), to seek justice (Isa 1:17; Mic 6:8; Lk 11:42) and to be peacemakers and love our enemies (Matt 5:9; 39; 44). These verses may suggest Christians should be pacifist i.e. hold to the belief that there's no justification for war.

But Paul's statement in Romans 12:18 suggest that may not be up to us all of the time. So, from Romans 12:18-19, we may conclude two things:

- 1) As Christians, we cannot (a) create conflicts or (b) avenge ourselves.
- 2) There may be times that it is necessary we defend or protect ourselves (Psa 82:3-4) or fight against unrighteousness (Jn 2:15).

Therefore, while we're expected to leave at peace with all men, we must be able to recognise when it is time to fight.

#### **How do we help people of such places especially Christians?**

God expects us to offer help to everyone who needs it, whether they're Christians or not. We see that in The Parable of the Good Samaritan (Lk 10:25-37). Jesus answered the crucial question asked: "Who is my neighbour?" (Lk 10:29), by illustrating that when we help others, we are being neighbourly to them (Lk 10:39).

The Afghans are our neighbour, just as much as those who live next door are and Jesus asked us to love our neighbour as we love ourselves (Lk 10:27). We must also be careful not to confuse evangelism with providing support and help to those who need it, even when they refuse to accept the good news. Remember that God is the only one that can change the heart of man (Jn 15:16).

We may also experience war or devastations of war in one form or the other in our everyday lives through times of conflicts, misunderstandings, disagreements and so on. Regardless, Christians must not seek to be at war and should trust in God to defend and protect us from all ills.

#### **Bottom line:**

Ephesians 6:12 says "**we do not wrestle against flesh and blood**". We must remember our problem is not with our fellow human beings (our neighbours) and seek
