Google Chrome

1. Open the browser and the **Settings** menu (or the **three vertical dots** to the right of the menu bar).
2. Scroll down and click on **Advanced Settings**.
3. Select **Open a specific page or set of pages** under **On Startup**.
4. Select **Set pages** and enter or add <http://rccgbethel.church/>.

Mozilla Firefox

1. Open Firefox. Press **Alt-T** on the keyboard and select **Options** from the drop-down menu or go to **Tools >> Options** from the main menu.
2. In the **Home** section, select **Homepage and new windows** and **Custom URLs...** from the field's drop down.

Microsoft Edge

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Satan 101

Text: 1 Thessalonians 2:17-18

We will continue our study of the book of Thessalonians and focus on these two verses today. Paul admitted Satan was more powerful than his own will and desires. No one likes it when prevented from doing what they're eager to do or worked hard towards. We become frustrated, depressed and may give up eventually. How is that possible when Paul serves a sovereign God? What's more, Paul was actually trying to support God's people.

It is impossible not to wonder about that. Who is Satan and why's he able to stop a believer from doing what he wants to do? He's defined as an adversary who opposes or stops another in purpose and action. He could transform himself and be deceitful to seduce his prey (2 Cor 11:13-15). You may've seen pictures of Satan with horns and so on. In fact, no one knows what he looks like or his gender, even if pronouns for him in the scriptures are masculine.

He was an angel and a master of disguises. Therefore, looking for him in what we can see is a waste of time (Eph 2:1-2). We need to unmask him first. He blinds minds so they don't see or comprehend God's good news. We may find it challenging to believe he can overpower God's will. That's because Satan is in control of this world (2 Cor 4:3-4). His cunning plan is simple, to seduce and deceive us with clever salesmanship, until he lures us away from God's will.

The truth is, his sole intent is to enslave us (Rom 6:16). The question for us is whether it's possible for Satan to stop a child of God. Theoretically, that should be impossible and the scriptures back that up (Romans 8:28-39; Deut 15:4-7; Matt 26:11). One reason is because we're no longer under his control (Eph 2:1-2; Col 1:13). However, that's when we accept and believe we're not of this world (Jn 17:15-16).

Therefore, there's no need to be afraid when we read verses like the text today. Satan cannot prevent the children of God from doing anything (1 Jn 3:9-10). Compare 1 Thessalonians 2:17-18 with Acts 16:6-7; 9-10. We can see how the Apostles had to bow to the Holy Spirit and remain where they are.

It suggests that God also stop us from doing certain things (Num 22:21-39) and when we become frustrated, we can often ascribe that to Satan. However, it could be God urging us to wait (1 Cor 2:7-8). So, that may be why Paul ascribed his frustration differently in these two passages? Just because what Paul wanted to do seemed good doesn't mean it was God's will.

Bottom line:

When God's people are led by the Holy Spirit, delays and obstacles are nothing to be frustrated about because he's promised that everything will work together for our good (Rom 8:28). Delays and obstacles could be turned into waiting and preparation time, in readiness for God's purpose to be achieved in our lives.
