

Google Chrome

- Open the browser and the Settings menu (or the three vertical dots to the right of the menu bar).

Mozilla Firefox

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

How do we honour leaders we disagree with?

Text: Romans 13:1-7

The first commandment with a blessing is to honour our parents and the penalty for breaking that law is quite strict. Moses took the commandment further to say a stubborn and rebellious child should be stoned to death by the community (Deut 21:18-21). This stems from the common practice to exercise strict and immediate punishment in times past. Why is there a difference today?

God gave us the law as a foreshadow of what's to come, when everything is revealed in Christ. When he called Israel, he promised them an earthly kingdom, with him as their God and ruler. That's theocracy, where the prophets, priests and kings represent God on earth. Today, the church and state are separate and we're no longer in a theocracy. That may be why Jesus said his kingdom is not in this world (Jn 18:36).

But we practice a form of theocracy still. We want to be a part of the earthly kingdom, but sometimes exercise theocratic rule or rights. Civic responsibilities owed to the government and society's different from what we owe God. We don't have to be born again either, to be useful in God's kingdom. Cyrus is an example of that.

Our text today instructs that all authorities are instituted by God and rebellion against them is a rebellion against God. Apostles Paul and Peter also repeated the same charges in a variety of forms (Tit 3:1-2; 1 Pet 2:13-14). However, there's a place for civil disobedience and one of the lines we should draw in the sand is when we're being asked to disobey God (Acts 4:16-20).

No human being is infallible and that includes those who we call men of God. God is the ultimate authority and the only one whose authority is unimpeachable. That's why Paul added a proviso to his command for people to follow him (1 Cor 11:1). However, when our leaders' directives are in line with God, scriptures tell us we must obey (Rom 13:1). These days we practice selective disobedience, even in the church. Cult of individuality or personalities are quite common in churches. We need to avoid falling foul of that.

When we engage in civil disobedience, it should be for a valid reason and not to inconvenience others. As Christians, we only have one ultimate authority and that's God's (Acts 17:5-7). Therefore, our allegiance must be to him (Heb 13:10-17). Abraham lived in tents because he was looking forward to God's promise. We can't hold tightly to this world such that we forget our home's in heaven and the earth is our temporary home (Heb 11:9).

Bottom line:

To whom do we owe our allegiance? Peter told us to submit to all human authority for the Lord's sake (1 Pet 2:13; Col 3:23-24) and Paul added that when we do, it's for our own sake too (1 Tim 2:2). When we honour those God put in authority over us even when we disagree with them, we honour God (Heb 13:17).
