

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Water baptism: it's purpose and link to salvation

Text: Matthew 3:13-17

Water baptism is a symbol of Jesus Christ's death, burial and resurrection. It is called water baptism to differentiate it from the common version observed in Judaism or other traditional churches and the implication or symbolism is more or less the same. In some practices, an adult or God-parent pledges to bring a baptised minor up to know God. Crucially however, it is necessary to be able to make the decision to follow Christ.

The act demonstrates its symbolism and Jesus made it clear it is to fulfil all righteousness. When we're immersed in the water, it is a symbol of entering into a relationship with Jesus Christ. We come as we are, clothed in our old life, old habits, mindset, pre-conceived notions, prejudice and behaviours. When we emerge, by faith we believe we're renewed and rebirthed (Col 2:12; 2 Cor 5:17).

So, among other things, water baptism symbolises the following:

<u>Trust and reliance on God</u>: It's our belief that all we need to have life is in Jesus (Rev 22:17; Acts 17:28). The rich young ruler desired "eternal life", but didn't know what he was really asking Jesus for (Mk 10:17-27). He didn't realise or couldn't appreciate that it is all or nothing and encompassing (Matt 16:24; Gal 2:20). He didn't count the cost (Lk 14:26-30).

<u>Obedience to God</u>: John knew Jesus didn't need to be baptised, but Jesus told him it was necessary to "*fulfil all righteousness*" (Matt 3:13-17). In Judaism, water is used as an outward symbol for internal cleansing (Isa 1:16; Ezek. 36:25; Psa. 51:2). This is what Jesus was doing when he washed his disciple's feet (Jn 13:5-11) and John fulfilled prophesy by preaching repentance and baptism (Mk 1:1-4; see also Mal 3:1; Isa 57:14). Peter also linked baptism to Noah and what happened during the flood (1 Pet 3: 18-22). For Peter, baptism is no longer the "*removal of the filth of the flesh*", but the "*pledge of good conscience*".

<u>Unity with all the saints</u>: As Christians, we belong to a community and the body of Christ and unity is core to the success of our walk with God within that (Matt 12:22-28). Therefore, we're never alone. This is emphasised in the two overarching commandments, as summed up by Jesus (Matt 22:37-40). Water baptism is a reminder of that.

<u>Our validation / justification</u>: The scriptures told us we're crucified, died and buried with Jesus. So, the life we live now is by faith (Gal 2:20). Water baptism marks the point at which the Holy Spirit is regenerated in us, when we become a new creation (Tit 3:5; 2 Cor 5:17).

It is commanded: In the great commission, Jesus commanded us to make disciples and baptise them (Matt 28:19). We can see all the symbolisms in the baptism of Jesus. However, it is not a prerequisite for salvation. Otherwise, Jesus couldn't have promised salvation to the criminal on the cross (Lk 23:39-43; Eph 2:8-9).

Bottom line:

Jesus felt it was important to both validate and participate in the practice. Therefore, it is a command we need to obey (John 13:14-17).
