

Google Chrome

Mozilla Firefox

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

The drivers of life: Insight / understanding

Text: 1 John 2:15-17

We've been exploring what God gives us that the world cannot give (1 Jn 2:16), talking about the Holy Spirit and peace. We also addressed insight / understanding in terms of our relationship with each other and God. Today, we will delve into other aspects of the gift of insight / understanding in more details.

Again and again, the disciples found it difficult to understand what Jesus was saying and on one occasion, they asked him why he speaks in parables. His response that they've been given the priviledge of knowing the "*mysteries of the kingdom of God*" may've been even more confusing to them (Lk 8:10) and we may wonder too.

Why did Jesus feel the need to speak in parables, knowing it makes what he's saying more complicated (Matt 13:10-11)? We may understand some of these things now and what they mean because we have the interpretations. We also have the privilege of teachings, concordances and expositions, but at the time, they could only ask Jesus to explain himself and he spent a lot of time doing just that.

The scriptures made it clear that even when we do understand, it's because the Holy Spirit reveals them to us (1 Jn 2:3; 20 AMP). When we're in Christ, the Holy Spirit checks our spirit when we hear something that's false, prompting us to double-check them. John said this is because the anointing of the Holy Spirit guides us into all truth, emphasising we need to remain in Christ for that to always be the case (1 Jn 2:27).

We need understanding and insight in four key areas. They include (1) understanding the word of God, (2) understanding his essential nature, (3) understanding his kingdom and (4) understanding him by revelation knowledge. Every now and again, God engineers some strategic encounters in order to perform miraculous works or change our lives. Such is the case with an Ethiopian when he encountered Philip (Acts 8:27-31). He was reading about the crucifixion of Jesus, but needed someone to explain what it was about (Acts 8:32).

Many Jews, Scribes and Pharisees in Jesus's day have probably read the scriptures several times over from cover to cover and yet, they couldn't understand when Jesus told them the scriptures spoke about him (Jn 5:39-40; Matt 22:45). Thus, when we understand many of these scriptures today, it is because the Holy Spirit explained them. Studying alone cannot give us clarity. That's why people were often astonished when Jesus spoke (Matt 7:28-29).

For example, how can we understand why our light afflictions are only for a moment or comprehend what eyes have not seen or ears heard; all the things God has prepared for those that love him (2 Cor 4:17-18; 1 Cor 2:9)? We can't, unless we have understanding. When Paul wrote about afflictions, we weren't there and can never say for sure why he wrote those words. Experiences, motives and intentions behind prophesies and utterances can only be understood when the Holy Spirit exposes them to us (Matt 13:11).

Bottom line:

When studying the word of God, study to understand what God is telling you. Don't take that for granted or treat it like another novel or a historical account (2 Tim 2:15).
