Google Chrome

- Open the browser and the Settings menu (or the three vertical dots to the right of the menu bar).
- 2. Scroll down and click on Advanced Settings.
- 3. Select Open a specific page or set of pages under On Startup.
- 4. Select **Set pages** and enter or add http://rccgbethel.church/.

Mozilla Firefox

- Open Firefox. Press Alt-T on the keyboard and select Options from the drop-down menu or go to Tools >> Options from the main menu.
- In the Home section, select Homepage and new windows and Custom URLs... from the field's drop down.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

The drivers of life: God's precious promises (Part II)

Text: 1 John 2:15-17 / 2 Peter 1:2-4

We're exploring the precious promises of God, started last week, as part of our study of the gifts from the father. Peter emphasised that God's promises are what enables us to share in God's divine nature. We've accepted we've no power to make anyone fulfil their promise unless protections, agreements or contracts are in place to hold them to it.

These have evolved over time, but the questions we may ask are these. How do we reach an agreement with God or make him fulfil his promises to us? What if he changes his mind? Can we do anything to compel him? Promises that cannot be enforced are useless. So, if there's no way to hold God to his promises, are they useless?

Jacob's life is one example illustrating how fickle man's promises can be. Following a number of betrayals, Jacob told his wives that his Uncle Laban change his wages ten times, using it to justify going back home. Left to Laban alone, Jacob may never have amounted to anything, but God had other ideas (Gen 31:4-13, in context Gen 30:25-31:55).

Abraham grappled with the idea of a guarantee too, forced to ask God how he can be sure of the promises made to him. God confirmed his covenant with a ceremony we may not fully understand. It involves Abraham's sacrifice, a flaming torch and a visit to him in a deep sleep (Gen 15:1-21). God's bound by his own oath and can never renege as we understood last week (Heb 6:11-20). No one can change his promises and there's no break clause.

For example, the Israelites had wealth transfer before they left Egypt as a result of God's covenant with Abraham (Exo 12:35-36). When God makes promises to man, there's nothing man can do to hold him to it. Only God can hold himself to account, but there's no limitation to the extent he will go to fulfil his promises. He can change, suspend and make new laws if necessary.

Bottom line:

Has God promised you something? If he has, believe that he will fulfil it because he's faithful and cannot deny himself (Heb 10:23; 2 Tim 2:13).
