

Google Chrome

- Open the browser and the Settings menu (or the three vertical dots to the right of the menu bar).

Mozilla Firefox

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Encounters with Jesus – The Samaritan woman

Text: John 4:1-42

Jesus was tired and should've been hungry (Jn 4:6; 8; 31-33). But he had to go through Samaria (Jn 4:4). Why is that, especially as we later learnt the Jews and Samaritans don't have anything to do with one another (Jn 4:9)? Some have suggested it was because he had a divine appointment with this Samaritan woman and that may be true. It does imply some form of predestination. It may also be easier or quicker to go through Samaria.

However, Jesus was also laying a template for us about discrimination and he did that several times (e.g. Lk 10:30-37; 17:11-19; 7:1-10; Mt 15:21-28). Whatever the reason, the stage was set for a remarkable encounter and the woman's name was never mentioned even once. Now we call her the Samaritan Woman.

So it was that she comes to the well at the sixth hour to find Jesus waiting (Jn 4:6). He asked for a drink and of course, the woman was surprised. She wondered what he was up to and reminded him of the feud. Instead of responding to her specific query, Jesus set out to introduce himself. He did this in a number of ways.

Jesus told the woman he's the source of the living water – a spring of water where we can be filled with everlasting life (Jn 4:10; 13-14; see also Jn 7:37-39). During a series of exchanges, Jesus confirmed she's had 5 husbands and not currently married. Suspecting he must be a Jewish prophet, she lodged a complaint about the Jews's insistent that Jerusalem is the only acceptable place to worship. Then, Jesus revealed he's the Messiah (Jn 4:24-26). This is one of a few places where Jesus explicitly made this revelation (See also Mk 14:61; 6).

What can learn several things from this encounter. God will go out of his way to bring salvation to those who are lost or chosen (Jn 4:34-35; Mt 18:12-14; 15:24; Lk 19:10; Jn 3:17; Lk 15:7). He will come to us, wherever we are and our sins, shame or past histories are never barriers (Jn 4:16-18; Isa 1:18). Neither is ignorance or religiosity (Jn 4:10-11; 20; 25; Acts 8:3; 9:1-9).

All God needs from us is to be receptive and see ourselves as we really are, in the mirror of his word, which is Jesus Christ (Jn 1:1-5). Notice that the woman was curious, willing to learn and accept her faults. She also didn't keep the Good News to herself and because of her, the Samaritans of Sychar had their encounters with Jesus too (Jn 4:39-42)

By Jesus's own testimony, the Messiah was sent to redeem the Jews (Mt 15:24). But Jesus constantly showed his disciples Jews don't have a monopoly on the Good News. No one's excluded (Mt 28:19-20) unless they're unreceptive (Mt 10:14-15; 1 Jn 2:2). Paul understood we're all heirs to the promise too (Gal 3:28-29).

Bottom line:

Jesus seeks **true worshippers** who will worship God in spirit and in truth (Jn 4:21-24). Nothing else can stand in between us and God (Rom 8:35-39). Only unbelief can (Mt 13:53-58; Heb 3:14-19).
