

Google Chrome

Mozilla Firefox

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Portraits of Jesus series: A transformational change

Text: Mark 2:23-28

There may be times when we face challenges so hard, we feel we can't go on. Mary may've felt like that when she went into labour. On top of everything else, there was no room anywhere except in a manger, where animals are kept. It must've been a harrowing time, but somehow Mary, Joseph and Jesus survived that night and so do we when we go through our own trials. As a result, the light of the glory of the Lord shone that night through the darkness for all who witness it (Lk 2:9; Jn 1:5). And so it does, in our time of darkness.

Born that night was the Son of Man, also known as the Lord of the Sabbath (Mk 2:28). Jesus said Sabbath was designed to meet the needs of people (Mk 2:27). However, we'll be forgiven to believe it's the other way round, with everything geared to meet the requirements of the Sabbath. A day of rest became a day of inconvenience and laws supposed to help often hold us in bondage (Mk 3:1-5; Jn 5:1-15). That's what Jesus freed us from.

He's the Son of Man. Jesus didn't mimic or pretend to be human. He was human and he identified with us and was proud to call himself the Son of Man. He faced the same challenges; hunger, thirst and was tempted like us (Jn 1:14; Matt 4:1-11). He came shivering in the night and was wrapped in swaddling clothes. He suffered like a man (Mk 8:31-33). He came to his own and they rejected him (Jn 1:11). He was known as the Messiah (Mk 8:27-30) and at the end, he was called the Son of God (Matt 27:50-54).

This is the core of the story of Christianity. It is the story of transformational change and it came when it is most desperately needed. The Son of Man became the Son of God. The blind can see. One born in a lowly manger will become the King of all ages and "of the increase of his government and peace there will be no end" (Isa 9:7). A maiden became a mother. A people who dwelt in the darkness saw a great light (Matt 4:16).

Bottom line:

Like the Sabbath, everything was created to support us (Colossians 1:16-23). Change is coming our way. May we experience these transformational changes in our lives, wherever and whenever it is needed in Jesus name (Rom 8:11).
