

Google Chrome

- 1. Open the browser and the **Settings** menu (or the **three vertical dots** to the right of the menu bar).

- 4. Select Set pages and enter or add <u>http://rccgbethel.church/</u>.

Mozilla Firefox

- 2. In the **Home** section, select **Homepage and new windows** and **Custom URLs...** from the field's drop down.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK Perfectly and wonderfully created

Text: Genesis 1:20-2:3

To solve the problem of darkness God created light and David once told us he had no problem with darkness (Ps 139:11-12). Yet, it took 2 days for God to create light in stages and he did it all for us, because without light, there's no life (Gen 1:3-8; Jn 1:4). Creation was a project God took on to solve specific problems for mankind, each creation with its own purpose. And so, Genesis may sometimes read like a love note from God to man.

Everything has a purpose. This may inspire us once again to ask what our purpose is. Some of us may be greater at identifying problems than solving them. In creation project, God showed us how to solve problems and he did it for a reason, because everything was leading to a single crescendo, making man in his own image, with a purpose (Gen 1:26-27).

No wonder David described creation story in such lyrical terms, while wondering why God loved mankind so much (Ps 8:1-9). While Adam was put to a deep sleep, God's final act was to make a companion for him from one of his ribs (Gen 2:21-24). Adam was no longer alone, but God also created man for companionship. At the cool of the day, he would come to fellowship with the man he had created (Gen 3:8).

Consequently, we can see that everything God made was with us in mind and every problem he solved was for us. So, we can only imagine to a point, the glory that's yet to be revealed (Rom 8:18-22). When God created man, he was expected to live a life of purpose forever and without blemish. Death and disease were never part of it. He made everything perfect for us until man fell and brought curse upon mankind.

That's why Paul said if God is for us, who can be "*[successful] against us*" (Rom 28:31 AMP) and God is still solving life's problem for us today. Moses was clearly overwhelmed by the scale of his responsibilities. When the Israelites got to the red sea, they could only see a problem they thought he couldn't solve. Yet the solution was in Moses's hand all along (Ex 14:15-16). He'd forgotten that God said he was going to be "a god to Pharaoh" (Ex 7:1).

Likewise, for every circumstance we face, there's a solution in us and our rod is the word of God. Every problem has a solution in his word (Jn 2:3-5). What is God saying to you about the problems you face (Matt 19:26)? Stay in his presence long enough, and you will find a solution (Ps 16:11). Wherever there's darkness, God is able to create light (Matt 19:26) for man and he created us for fellowship with him.

Bottom line:

In Christ Jesus, we're never helpless because God loves us so much, right from creation, that he wouldn't withhold anything from us (Ps 8:4-5; 1 Cor 6:3). Secondly, there's no situation or circumstance that doesn't have a solution. We only need to ask (Ps 2:8).
