Google Chrome

Mozilla Firefox

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Christianity under siege

Text: Revelations 13:1-10

Although Jesus told his disciples he was going to be crucified and will rise again (e.g. Matt 17:22–23), they never seemed to grasp what he was saying. It took some convincing for them to believe he was indeed resurrected (Lk 24:11; 13-26). Saul, who became Paul had another unique experience and his encounter with Jesus made him blind for three days (Acts 9:1-3; 5-18).

It must've been devastating and perplexing for Saul to suddenly lose his sight, especially when he used to be able to see. Imagine how someone born visually impaired may feel. Can they ever be sure what anything looks like? As Christians, we sometimes take it for granted that everyone can see or understand what we see. However, the truth is the world is incapable of seeing what we see and if we're not careful, we may begin to see from their perspective.

For instance, in the age of social media, it seems Christianity's in retreat all over the world and we're under siege (Rev 13:1-10). The beast in today's text probably sound more impressive, in contrast to the lamb of God that was slain for our sins (Rev 13:8). Christianity, with its simple message, may often leave people uninterested too. Have you ever wondered why God doesn't just reveal himself in all his glory, power and might to the world? It could've make it easier for people to believe him, perhaps (Matt 27:39-44).

Jesus did several miraculous deeds and still couldn't get traction from several, including religious leaders of his day. Some will never believe (Matt 11:16-19). It's amazing that when God open people's eyes and they see him in his glory, it leaves a life changing impact (Acts 9:1-3; 5-18). However, we can't take that for granted. The disciples spent a lot of time with Jesus. He explained what would happen and still, they didn't believe until their eyes were opened (Lk 24:30-31).

Likewise, Christianity may appear to be under siege right now, becoming less fashionable by the day, but a time will come when people will worship a God their fathers have not known (Deut 28:64), when the risen King will return in all his glory. Do you believe? Are you holding on to the faith you have received? Because there'll be every tendency to weaken and reject what you know, to convince you it is not real. For instance, over two thousand years have passed since Jesus came. Do we still believe he's coming again? This is not the time to give up (1 Cor 15:1-8; Phil 3:10-11).

Bottom line:

People may not see or believe what you see now, because it's often easy to reject or be selective in what we want to believe. Therefore, pray that you will continue to see Jesus, the way, the truth and the life as he really is (Jn 14:6).
