Google Chrome

Mozilla Firefox

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Entering into God's rest

Text: Genesis 2:1-3

God created everything, gave man dominion over it all and rested. We learnt last week that God introduced himself to Moses as the self-existing one (Ex 3:14), that it means he doesn't need a support system. He's the one that never sleeps nor slumber (Psa 121:4) and his strength's never depleted, so he doesn't need sleep or to recuperate nor is he ever tired (Isa 40:31). Why then, is it said that he rested?

Two reasons. The first is that he rested because he completed his task. There are times we can't rest even when tired because we haven't done everything we needed to do, like Jesus stated in John 17:4-5. With confidence, Paul did the same (2 Tim 4:6-8) and many may love to be able to look back and make the same declarations at the end of their lives.

The second reason God rested is because of us, as an example for us to follow. That's why he created the Sabbath day (Mk 2:27). The four lepers in 2 Kings 7:3-11 entered into God's rest by acting on the thought planted into their minds. Ostracised from the society, they lived a hopeless existence until God led them into his rest.

Entering God's rest means he's completed his tasks, all for our benefit (Eph 2:8-9). God created the self-sustaining Garden of Eden and provided all the resources Adam and Eve could ever need, until they fell from grace (Gen 3:19). He gave the Israelites instructions not to plant or harvest in the seventh year, so they and the land will rest, promising them provision. They don't have to toil or lack (Lev 25:1-7). Jesus made a reference to this phenomenon in John 4:34-38. He pointed out to his disciples that they're harvesting where they haven't planted.

Adam's sin interrupted their rest (Heb 4:3), but God has given us the opportunity to regain what Adam lost in his son. So, true rest can begin with Christ. We know sin's a kind of leprosy because it's just as contagious. That's why a group of ten lepers were unable to approach Jesus and stood at a distance, shouting. After he healed them, one returned and fell at his feet (Lk 17:11-19). He can now draw close to Jesus.

Sometimes we toil and toil until we get a particular job or promotion, but that's still by human effort. Other times, it comes easily without any effort on our part. Man's effort can only get us so far. There's no limit to where God's rest can take us (Matt 11:28). God gave the Israelites specification to build a temple and prevented them from toiling to build it. Likewise, we're God's temple (1 Cor 3:16) and God is telling us he doesn't need our sweat or effort.

What was it like for the Israelites to enter into his rest? One indication is they entered the land of promise at the time of harvest. There's a way we can enter into God's rest too, where God's done everything and we reap the benefits.

Bottom line:

Sometimes we may think Christianity is hard (Phil 2:12), but there's a place where everything becomes easy because he has completed the work of salvation, a place where success is not about how hard we can work (Rom 8:28; Matt 6:33).
