Google Chrome

Mozilla Firefox

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

What can we learn about Nicodemus's journey with Christ?

Text: John 3:1-10

We may remember our theme this year is "**To be all in**" (Heb 10:38-39 AMP). What does that in practical sense? As a member of the Jewish ruling class, Nicodemus took a risk when he sought to know more about the Saviour, Jesus Christ (Jn 3:1-2). Nicodemus could've done nothing about his curiosity, given the obstacles he faced.

What lengths have we gone to, to draw closer to God this year? Although we may never know if Nicodemus became convicted, we know he wasn't rebuffed. He kept questing for answers. He was brave enough to challenge the injustice of the moment during Jesus's trial (Jn 7:50-51) and although he must've been confused by Jesus's death, he joined Joseph of Arimathea to give Jesus a fitting and dignified burial (Jn 19:38-42)

It's sometimes hard to buck the trend or challenge the status quo. However, could we be here, at this time, for that purpose? In the book of Esther, Mordecai and Esther, his uncle's daughter were in a foreign land just like us too, at a time when there's impending danger of massacre – and perhaps extinction – for their people.

At great risk, they fought against hate and discrimination to save the Jews (Est 4:1-16). The rest of is history. Although Ezekiel knew God can do anything, he probably never imagined the dry bones could be brought back to life (Eze 37:1-14). Likewise, we may think a situation is hopeless, but these stories remind us we can never think that way.

We can always find ways around obstacles in our path. Nicodemus did, meeting Jesus at night. Paul was always reminding us we have different gifts in the body of Christ (Eph 4:11-13). If we're not so good at going out or preaching, there's always other things we can do. For example, we could set apart time to fast and pray on their behalf.

There's this believe that Gen Z / younger people are disillusioned with the church and mainstream delivery systems, and don't trust the messengers, consuming most of their information online. Perhaps we can reach them where they are. If we're great content creators, for example or through music, podcasting etc., we can minister to them on social media.

Jesus told Peter he would build his church on the confession revealed to him by the Holy Spirit. That suggests God needs us just as much as we need him (See also Dan 9:1-3; 10:10-12; cf Jer 25:11). Like Peter, we must proclaim he's Christ in every way possible (Matt 16:15-18). What promise of God is waiting for us to do something, before it's fulfilled?

Bottom line:

We've all been called to reach out and evangelise. Not just the Pastors and church leaders (Matt 28:18-20). We mustn't let obstacles stand in our path or accept defeat because God is the only one who says when it's over (Eze 37:11-14).
