Google Chrome

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Hospitality and generosity

Text: Genesis 18:1-5; 19:1-3

Is hospitality different from being generous? Abraham and Lot had no idea they were entertaining angels to start with, when they pressed the two men to come dine with them. Being hospitable or generous is a calling that may often come with risks or danger. However, we're told in the scriptures to do good unto *all* men, especially those in the household of faith and the key word is "all" (Gal 6:10). It may be difficult to protect ourselves if we're to remain obedient.

When Lot offered hospitality to the angels the men of the city of Sodom and Gomorrah could've made him and his family suffer the consequence if the angels didn't save him (Gen 19:4-11). Likewise, we must trust God to protect us. There are several other examples in the scriptures about showing kindness to our fellow human beings. The widow of Zarephath was one (1 Kngs 17:7-16) and Jesus told a parable about the Samaritan who helped an injured man (Lk 10:25-36).

The lawyer who came to Jesus had a burning question, but he already knew about the laws and understood who his neighbour was. Jesus however challenged him to think beyond his usual assumptions of who might be his neighbour. The injured man didn't find help from the Levite and Priest, so-called men of God and people who should've helped extended help, perhaps because they were afraid of being in the same danger the man was.

We can always find excuses not to help others or be obedient to the leading of God. The widow of Zarephath gave Elijah the last meal she and her son had to eat. As a widow, she was one of the most destitute people in a society that may not be helpful to her. There were great risks to her, but in the end, she obeyed Elijah and even gave him a place to stay in her house.

How many times do we think of people less able than ourselves? Are we overlooking people who need our help right now? Are we turning our face away from the distress of others? In God's kingdom, we're expected to help when we have the opportunity to, but do we just say "it is well" and move on? We should know the word of God will never change.

Bottom line:

Let's pray for the grace to extend hospitality and help to others when they need it.
