



Google Chrome

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Ishmael must go - Part II

Text: Genesis 21:8-12

In Part I, we concluded God's omnipotent in all situations. If he doesn't do something, it's because he doesn't want to. We need to know who he is and he keeps his word and promises to us (Heb 10:23; 2 Pet 3:9). Paul once said Satan hindered him (1 Thess 2:18). In another place he said the Holy Spirit stopped / enabled him (Acts 16:6-7; 1 Cor 2:4).

When things happen in a particular way, it is because God wills it to be so (Job 1:6-22). We may not see or comprehend God's infinite purpose until we stop seeing death as the final point and a failure (Matt 10:28). In our text today, Sarah decided Ishmael must go because he cannot become heir with her son Isaac.

Likewise, we too may have "Ishmaels" in our lives and before we can enter into God's plan for us, we may have to get rid of them first (Heb 12:1). It could be a habit, relationship, situation or sin, but not necessarily. Anything that can stop us from experiencing the fullness of the inheritance of the Saints in Christ Jesus (Col 1:12) is an "Ishmael" and we usually know what it is.

For Paul and Peter, it was their legalistic Jewish heritage. It made Paul persecute the church, but he was able to give it up for Christ (Phil 3:7-11). It's no wonder he became an Apostle to the Gentiles and his ministry thrived to God's glory. Peter in contrast found it difficult, even when God told him to in a vision (Acts 10:9-48). Peter would later be called out for hypocrisy (Gal 2:11-13).

There's no permissive will of God and no gradient of acceptance of God's will. We're either in his will or we're not. And when we're not, we're exposed and in danger. For example, the Israelites were commanded not to intermarry with the Canaanites, but they failed to heed God's warning and everything God said came true (Deut 7:3-4; 1 Kngs 11:2; Ezra 9:1-2). They wanted a king and ultimately these things became problems for them (Hos 13:10-11).

The will of God may appear unattractive to us at times. We may wonder if we can ever find our "Isaac" if let go of "Ishmael". However, we will never come into our inheritance with Christ Jesus unless we let go of the Ishmael(s) in our lives. Being born again is just the beginning. Our ability to may determine the extent of our walk with God and when we do, God does amazing things in our lives.

Bottom line:

Identify the Ishmael(s) in your life and let go of them today.
