Google Chrome

- Open the browser and the Settings menu (or the three vertical dots to the right of the menu bar).
- 2. Scroll down and click on Advanced Settings.
- 3. Select Open a specific page or set of pages under On Startup.
- 4. Select **Set pages** and enter or add http://rccgbethel.church/.

Mozilla Firefox

- Open Firefox. Press Alt-T on the keyboard and select Options from the drop-down menu or go to Tools >> Options from the main menu.
- In the Home section, select Homepage and new windows and Custom URLs... from the field's drop down.
- Enter or paste the URL: http://rccgbethel.church/ or click Use Current Page if you are already on our website.

Microsoft Edge

- 1. Click the **three horizontal dots** to the right of the top menu bar.
- Select Settings and select A Specific Page or Pages from the Open Microsoft Edge With section drop down options.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

How can we pursue peace without compromising our own safety, beliefs or identity?

Text: Matthew 5:9

The first point to make is that safety, beliefs and identity are not considerations addressed in bible texts, in relation to the pursuit of peace. In fact, **Matthew 5:39** suggests we invite more violations on our persons instead. It is however recognised that we may have very little control in the matter (Rom 12:17-21).

The necessity for self-defence is also recognised. However, that shouldn't be at the exclusion of seeking to break through resistance to peace. Thus, pursuing peace may require sacrificing not just our own comfort, but ego too. Accepting compromises could be difficult or humiliating. We do it because God asks us to.

Prioritising peace could also save us a lot of trouble down the line, as recognised in the scriptures (Exo 22:2-3). Anger could lead to lasting harm, with unpredictable consequences (Eph 4:26-27). In general and, the onus is on each of us as Christians to keep the peace, even when under threat (**Rom 12:17**). In the garden of Gethsemane, Jesus led by example (Matthew 26:51-54).

The second point to make is that consideration for safety, beliefs and identity may be an indication of the strength of our faith / trust in God. The scriptures said it's in God we live, move and have our being (Acts 17:26-28). We are never alone. God is with us (Isa 41:10) and his plan for us include pursuing peace at all times.

We may have noticed that, starting with the 10 commandments, seven of which is are devoted to our relationships with each other (Exo 20:3-17). Jesus raised the stakes, charging us to love our enemies too and pray for those who spitefully use and persecute us (Matt 5:44; see also Pro 25:21-22).

Bottom line:

So, even in our pursuit of peace, we surrender to God's will in obedience and let him take care of the rest, making that a way of life, in truth. It is part of seeking the kingdom of God first and he will reward us (Matt 6:33; Heb 6:10).
